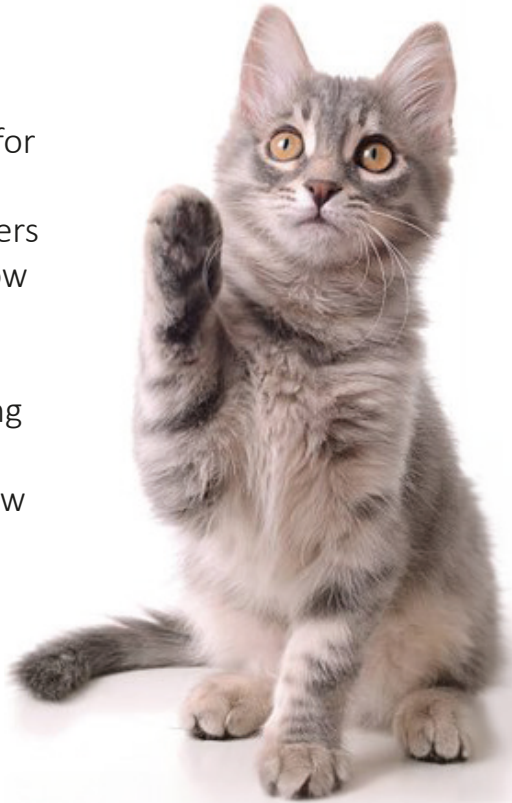


# Norwood Payneham and St Peters Council

I'm Cinnamin and **desexing** stops female cats like me from coming into season and attracting many undesexed male cats.



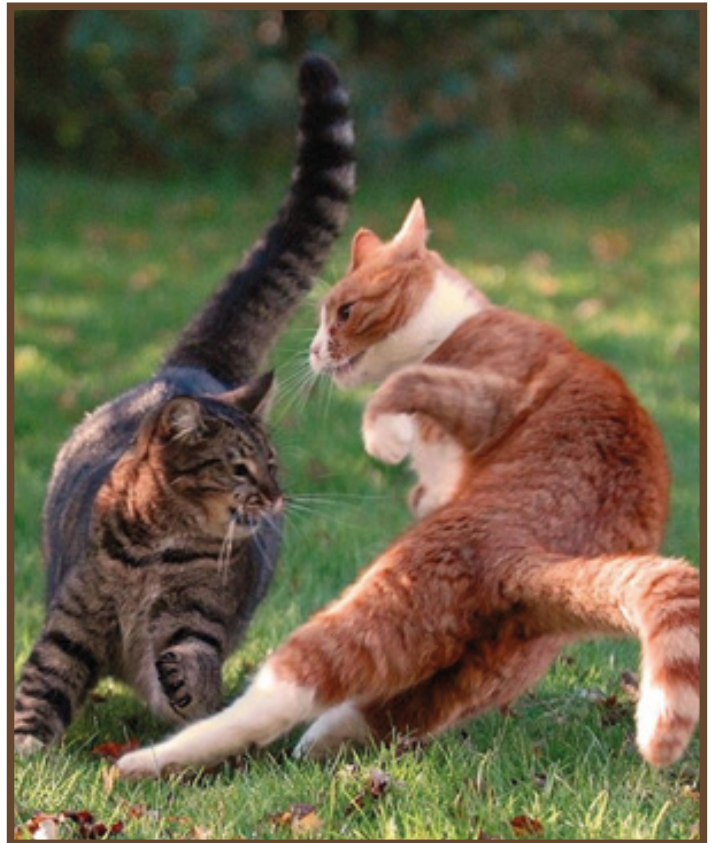
**Desexing** prevents me from getting pregnant and having more babies and becoming weakened by continually having kittens. Desexing also prevents the terrible misery when my babies are taken away from me. I cry for the kittens and how they suffer when they are separated from each other. I am being **desexed** and this is my last litter, so my baby stays with me this time.



I'm Playboy and **desexing** stops male cats like me crossing dangerous roads and travelling away from home looking for mates. It stops us spraying pungent tomcat urine and caterwauling over mates at night time, annoying nearby humans.

I'm Top Cat and he's Tabby. Before I was desexed, I kept getting hurt in nasty brawls.

**Desexing** reduces the injuries caused by fighting over mates and also helps to keep us healthier and less likely to get sick.





I'm Maverick, one of the many **desexed free living cats**, that can't be confined. We are essential for successful cat management through Desex and Return to Home programs. We stop new undesexed cats from continually stealing our territory, breeding and filling it up with kittens.

I'm Pumpkin and I'm marking my home to keep out intruder cats. I am **desexed** so my spray is mild- not strong and pungent like an undesexed tomcat. If I don't mark my territory with my spray, a tomcat will and make it much smellier.





Yes, I am a professional rodent catcher, and I can't be confined as I would not be able to do my job of controlling the rats and mice. I am **desexed**, well cared for, fed and managed and I am an asset to the community because without cats like me there would be more plagues of rodents. I also deter the snakes that are attracted by the rats and mice and help to stop people from using deadly rat poison.

I'm Samantha and I am terrified because without enough rodent catchers, the rat and mouse population is increasing, and residents are using heaps of rat baits.

I have nothing to do every day as I am shut in a house. I have never known the love and companionship of being with another cat. If I could go outside, I may be able to make friends with the cats I see through the window that visit the garden. I can always go inside at night to be safe, but I am so sad with being permanently imprisoned.
